Dynamo magician buried alive



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Magician Dynamo has been wowing audiences with his mind-bending tricks for years. The 40-year-old Bradford star has won multiple awards including TV Choice Awards and BAFTA Nominations for his incredible series Dynamo: Magician Impossible.

However, in 2017, he was in the middle of his first live tour in 2017 when he suddenly stopped the tour and vanished from the spotlight. Appearing on a new episode of Diary of a CEO podcast, Dynamo - real name Steven Frayne - opened up on the real reason for his sudden disappearance.

Speaking to host Steven Bartlett, Dynamo said: "I think the the tour kind of run its course, we did a lot of countries and a lot of tickets and it was amazing. I like pushing the envelope with magic and with everything I do and I felt like that time on the road gave me time to have a lot of new ideas.

"I felt like I wanted to try and bring some of those ideas to life but some of those ideas had to get put on hold because it was shortly after that that I got really sick with my Crohn's." Dynamo was diagnosed with Crohn's disease when he was a teenager and had part of his intestine removed when he was 17.

According to the NHS, Crohn's disease is a lifelong type of inflammatory bowels disease in which parts of the digestive system are inflamed. The exact cause of Crohn's disease is unknown, but it's been linked to things like your genes and a problem with the immune system.

When asked what had happened to him, Dynamo answered: "I got food poisoning that gave me campylobacter which is basically the worst type of food poisoning you can get. That combined with my Crohn's was recipe for disaster and I remember I was in hospital.

"It was like 10pm and I was getting ready to go to bed and I went to the bathroom and I had this like horrible feeling in my stomach but I've got Crohn's so I'm used to kind of having to numb these these feelings, I'm used to just thinking 'okay it's going to be uncomfortable for like half an hour and it'll pass' and it wasn't going away.

"Then suddenly blood was coming out of my mouth, I was vomiting blood, it was coming out of both sides and I didn't know what to do, it would it wouldn't stop I was in so much pain. I was screaming to my wife and I got rushed to hospital."

He went on to explain that he was placed on medication by doctors and was placed on a drip, however nothing could get rid of the pain. He was then told that his Crohn's had spread to other parts of his bowel and that he has developed a type of reactive arthritis.



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Dynamo added that months after he was discharged from hospital and had gotten over his food poisoning, he would experience shooting pains in his joints while doing normal daily activities. He struggled with his mobility and admitted he felt like his body was "deteriorating."

Dynamo then went through multiple medical trials in a bid to find the right treatment for him and he said that some medications made his symptoms worse. He finally found a medication that he said was "incredible" but then the Covid-19 pandemic happened and his medication stopped working.

This led to more medical trials until finally in 2021, he found a medication that worked. He explained: "Even now I'm on that but I still have like three days a week where I'm really bad, my joints just don't really work that well and my stomach feels bad but that was a big part of the reason why I kind of, I guess disappeared for a while."

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
